

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President's Report June 2022

Compensation Claims: Our four Advocates, assisted by our Administration staff, are processing over 800 DVA Compensation Claims. With most claims taking more than 2 years for action to be commenced by DVA staff we need more volunteer assistance for our Advocates and Administration staff. We must keep all our clients informed and give further assistance where needed. We desperately need more staff.

If you have time to assist us in our office, you would be more than welcome. If you are interested in becoming an Advocate then there is no better mentor than our senior Advocate, Flavia Senter. Our office hours are 9am to 3pm Mondays to Thursdays and we would like to extend them to include Fridays. For any information, please phone me on 0448 195 020. It is all about Veterans helping Veterans and their families.

The DVA's Advocacy Training and Development Program (ADPP) is again undergoing significant changes. Five or six years back DVA's Training and Information Program (TIP) was the pathway for Advocates training and recognition of all Advocates' registered qualifications. DVA replaced the TIP system and introduced the Advocacy Training and Development Program which was unsuccessful and major changes were made soon after. To date, Ex-Service Organisations have not been impressed with the management of the ADTP and their activities and the lack of scheduled training courses.

Go back to the replacement of the initial Training and Development Program. Many long-serving and knowledgeable Advocates were required to retrain and requalify under the new system (ADPT) or give up their advocacy duties. A very cruel and unpopular impact on outstanding people making a significant difference for fellow veterans.

Our Senior Advocate Flavia returned to work on Monday 23rd May. Flavia, you are an amazing person.

The South East Queensland Veteran Wellbeing Centre tender has been decided and awarded to Lives Lived Well Organisation. Subject to Lives Lived Well submitting a suitable business plan to DVA that organisation will become the go-to place for all Veterans in South East Queensland for assistance for wellbeing needs and DVA services. I am willing to support all activities and services that will assist Veterans and their families.

Vietnam Veterans Day, Thursday, 18th August 2022. We will be holding our Memorial Service here, in our grounds, 18 Leagues Club Drive NERANG, at 10.30am for an 11am start. A light lunch will follow the Service.

Membership Fees are now due.



Veteran Wellbeing Centres

The Department of Veterans Affairs is introducing Veteran Wellbeing Centres across Australia. It is intended that these Veteran Wellbeing Centres will be a shopfront to provide simple and seamless access to relevant Veteran services. The following is provided for your information:

Overview: The centres focus on health and wellbeing and will be a welcoming hub for veterans and their families. They will connect veterans and their families to a range of services that include support for transition, employment, health and social connection.

Centres have been developed in Townsville, Darwin, Perth, Adelaide, Wodonga and Nowra. Each centre is at a different stage of development and DVA is working closely with the lead organisation in each location to maximise benefits for local veterans and their families.

Centres are already delivering and coordinating services in their community. The successful organisation (or consortium) is responsible for governance.

Role of Wellbeing Centres: Wellbeing describes how you feel about yourself and your life. It includes a complex combination of biological, lifestyle, socio-economic, societal and environmental factors. Access to health care, welfare support and other interventions can greatly affect an individual's sense of wellbeing. (Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, 2018).

The aim of each Wellbeing Centre is to provide veterans and their families with greater access to wellbeing services and support in their local community. They act as a shopfront to provide simple and seamless access to relevant services. This includes support for transition, employment, health and social connection, and advocacy.

The centres will work closely with state and territory governments, ex-service organisations, businesses and other organisations. They will link veterans and their families to services that align with the needs and opportunities of the local area.

Accessing Wellbeing Centres: All current and former serving Australian Defence Force (ADF) members, including reservists, and their families can access the centres and services they offer.

The organisations that operate from each centre will have their own guidelines and as such will put in place any relevant cost arrangements and charges.


Services provided

Transition and employment support ESO advocacy services Social connectedness Physical and mental health services Community engagement



Vale Paul Clarke



Paul Clarke passed away on June 5th 2022, and his memorial service was held at the Hemmant Cemetery on Friday June 17th. Paul was a veteran, and served in the 104th Signal Regiment, receiving the Australian Active Service Medal 1945-1975 with Vietnam Clasp, Vietnam Medal, Australian Defence Medal and Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal with 1960 Bar.



The memorial service included a "Poppy Ceremony", where any veteran or their representative could come forward and lay a poppy on Paul's coffin, and a large number of Veterans did so.

Paul's coffin was draped with a "Poppy" memorial blanket and the Vietnam Veterans Association of Australia flag, as well as a bouquet of flowers and a small cross with family significance.

The service was very well attended, and among the invitees were representatives from the Veterans' Support Group and Men's Shed, namely Peter Handy, Peter Cameron, Kevin Roberts and Andy Bryson.

Following the service, attendees were invited to the Wynnum RSL for refreshments and a further ceremony. Paul expressed his wish for his medals to

be presented to a young Air Force member Justin, a friend of the family, and Peter Handy was honoured to present the medals to him. Paul is survived by his wife Dot, and she was showered with many hugs and well-wishes by

friends and family. Paul and Dot had an agreement.

Sub Branch President's Report - June, 2022

President's Report - June 2022.









June already, and winter is well and truly here, with temperatures in the low single digits. Covid-19 is still with us, but with the added complication of a very virulent flu season, so keep up your personal hygiene practices to help minimise contracting either of these viruses. Despite this, the Subbranch and Men's Shed are thriving, with some welcome new members to bring new ideas into the fold.

Following the discovery of a huge termite infestation in the eastern wall of the Qld. Branch building, (as detailed in the 1st quarter edition), professional Pest Control contractors were called in, and after careful investigation, the termites were treated, and temporary repairs have been made. Repair quotes have been obtained, and as the amount is considerable, suitable grant applications were called for, with the resultant time lag, so final repairs will be done some time down the track. We took the opportunity to have the Men's Shed inspected as well, and while no significant damage was found, the decision was made to have both buildings protected with a termite barrier system. Hopefully these precautions will ensure no further termite "surprises" in the future.

All organisations, Men's Sheds included, must be flexible in their outlook in order to continue to survive and thrive if possible. In keeping with this philosophy, the decision was made to change the name of the Men's Shed from "Vietnam Veterans Support Group Men's Shed Nerang" to "Veterans Support Group Men's Shed Nerang". The new name will now be the same as that already registered with the AMSA, and it better represents the aims and objectives of the SubBranch so as to appeal to all Veterans, not just those from the Vietnam theatre. Our logo will also be changed to the new wording, but will keep the reference to the three services, Army, Navy, and Air Force. New signs have been ordered to facilitate the changes and will be delivered in the near future.

I take this opportunity to wish all our veterans, members and their families a safe, healthy and Covid and flu free winter, and encourage you all to continue to partake of our facilities and support for the remainder of the year.





MIKE COLERIDGE. Photographer in Vietnam.

The iconic photo (left) was taken by an Australian photographer assigned to Vietnam. It has become the symbol of Australian soldiers in Vietnam and has been used all over the world to depict the war. This image has been immortalised in memorials, museums and etchings, however it is only one of 558 still photos and 54 films taken by Mike Coleridge which are now housed in the Australian War Memorial's collection.

Michael Coleridge, born 11th July, 1933, was an unaccompanied 16 year old emigrant from Slovenia. Manual labour was his first employment, then at 18 he worked in rural NSW. He eventually travelled to Darwin where he found excitement and earned a private pilot's licence.

It was 1957 when he enlisted in the Australian Army. His lack of formal education prevented him from entering the new Army Aviation Corps, so he joined the Royal Australian Artillery Corps. In 1961 Gunner Coleridge was posted to Malaysia, during which time he made films, using his own cameras, for the British Army.

In 1963, back in Australia, he joined the Royal Australian Army Education Corps as a public relations photographer. He also married and had 2 children and 1 stepchild from his wife.

After his marriage failed he became a single parent of 2 children. When he was posted to Vietnam 19th November, 1966, he made the difficult decision to leave his children in the care of a family in Melbourne. Sergeant Coleridge was posted to Saigon Headquarters, however he spent most of his time in Nui Dat (1ATF). In the first 12 months he recorded the activities of 5RAR, 6RAR and 7RAR as well as elements of 1ATF. He developed his own films in a makeshift darkroom which he constructed himself.

Mike carried many cameras, including 35mm, 120mm still cameras and a 16mm Bell and Howell movie camera. From his own idea he also filmed in colour. All colour film had to be privately processed in Saigon. This expense came out of his own pocket. Considering most of his salary was sent back to Melbourne to support his children, this must have put a strain on his finances. Many of his colour films were converted to black-and-white for use in the media of the day. By September, 1967 he was eventually rewarded with replacement stock by the Army Public Relations Directorate in Canberra, acknowledging the high standard of the colour footage as well as personally supplying the film.

Mike Coleridge continued.....

He did what he had to.


But later Coleridge recalled the Army offered him and his young family no support. Remember, Coleridge wasn't a highly-paid glamorous, independent photojournalist. He was an enlisted serviceman - not a private citizen. The most important thing to him was that he was a single father to two children left with another family. Because of his status as a single father he resisted staying in the Army. He chose instead to travel the countryside, finding work as a photographer for the Melbourne Truth and other jobs, always supporting his two children. He moved to Darwin, then to North Queensland in the early 1970's. There he drove steam locomotives in the cane fields; then mined gold in Western Australia before moving to New South Wales. He and his children settled in Canberra in 1984 where he worked, for a time, as an attendant at the Australian War Memorial. His children were now grown up so he began growing walnuts on a property at Jerangle, NSW. He finally settled on a property on the outskirts of Braidwood, where he raised Angus cattle.

Mike's health was always an issue, including cancer of the bladder and later lung cancer. He experienced a bad fall just before Christmas 2011 resulting in a double fracture of the

spine. He passed away peacefully in hospital on 10th January 2011. He is survived by his son, David, daughter, Rhonda, and granddaughter, Julia.

Coleridge's chopper pick-up was a forgotten photo for two decades, before the Australian War Memorial plucked it from the archives.

Beer Stew

Ingredients:

1 1/2 kg chuck beef steak

1/2 cup plain flour

2 tbsp vegetable oil

30 g butter

4 large potatoes (peeled and thickly sliced)

4 onions sliced

2 carrots (large thickly sliced)

1 teaspoon black peppercorns

3 cups beer

2 tblspn soy sauce

3 bay leaves

2 cups Massel Beef style liquid stock

Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to 180 c.
- Trim meat of excess fat and cut into 2cm cubes. Toss in flour and shake off excess
- 3. Heat oil and butter in heavy-based pan. Cook the meat quickly in small batches until the outside is well browned. Drain on paper towel.
- 4. Arrange potatoes in bottom of a deep 14-cup casserole dish. Place meat, onions and carrots on top. Sprinkle with peppercorns.
- 5. Pour in beer, beef stock, soy sauce and bay leaves
- Bake uncovered for 2 hours or until meat in tender.Serve with crusty bread.





Of the praises of their mates some often do sing


But the greatness of Mateship seems an over-blown thing



Stretcher-Bearers

Stretcher Bearers is a compelling account of the experience of Australian stretcher-bearers during the First and Second World Wars. Respected military historian, Mark Johnston traces the development of formal stretcherbearing from its origin in the early nineteenth century under Napoleon to the Second World War. Johnston draws on accounts by stretcherbearers who worked on the front line, as well as tributes from rescued soldiers, to deepen our understanding of the crucial role these soldiers played in Gallipoli, Palestine, the Western Front in World War I, and in the Middle East and the Pacific in World War II. The narrative is further driven by rich imagery, featuring over 130 full-page photographs.


And sometimes when the 'phone rings getting on towards Christmas time, Dad's jaw begins to tighten as he's listening on the line.



He knows the satisfaction of riding a horse he has bred and broken-in with a saddle he has made himself for a day's mustering. Like most bush boys, he can handle shoeing tools, fencing gear, carpentry and welding equipment, and turn his hand to any of the hundred and one tasks necessary for survival in the bush.

Born in rural New Zealand in 1950, he is now a naturalised Aussie and proud of it. He has loved words and verse ever since his father gave him a copy of Banjo Patterson's verses when he was 10 years old.

Initially he self published books of his own poetry called "Duck for Cover", "Still Ducking", "Dinkum Poetry" and "Saga of the Dog", but in 2003, Central Queensland University Press published his anthology of 86 poems plus 6 short stories entitled "The Cattle Dog's Revenge". This is now the only book available for sale.



His first CD "The Cattle Dog's Revenge" was released in 2001 and his second CD "Dinkum Poetry" was released in 2002.

Jack recites his own works plus other bush favourites, with fire and gusto to the delight of his audiences both old and young. His life long experience with horses, sheep, cattle and all bush things adds a ring of authenticity to his renditions.

Until August 2001, he ran a horse back, trail riding business known as "Red Gum Ridge Trail Rides" 18 kms SE of Stanthorpe high up in the border ranges, which kept his hand in as a saddler, farrier, horse educator and an occasional blade shearing demonstrator.

He has recently closed this business due to Doctor's orders regarding some old rodeo injuries, to concentrate on his writing and Bush Poetry Performances. He has a column on Aussie Bush Poetry featuring some of Australia's lesser known bush poets, in the "Australian Horseman" Magazine which comes out every three months.

His wins in bush poetry competitions include:

- Highly Commended place in th Bronze Swagman Award for 2012 "The Water of the Wells Beersheba 1917"
- Golden Gumleaf Award 2004 for Best Original Book of Verse "The Cattle Dog's Revenge"
- His CD "The Cattle Dog's Revenge" was a finalist in the 2002 Australian Bush Laureate Awards at Tamworth and his latest CD "Dinkum Poetry" has been nominated as a finalist for 2003
- The Original Performance Section, National Bush Poetry Championship at the Brisbane Ekka 11th August 2001 as well and wins and placings in many other regional contests
- The Tenterfield Oracles of the Bush Written Section in 1999, and Performance Section in 2000 and 2001
- The Asthma Foundation of NSW's "Bush Poet of the Year 2001" in Sydney on 30th April 2001

His books and CDs have sold as far afield as Britain, Canada, New Zealand and the United States as well as all over Australia. A piece of Jack's poetry also adorns the wall of "Café Oz" in Paris, France.

His CDs have had air play on Alan Jones and John Laws radio programmes as well as ABC National and a host of regional stations.

Australia and the United Nations

The UN was officially started on 24th October, 1945 with 51 member states.

"To maintain international peace and security" was its initial goal and remains so to this day. The number has grown to 193 member states. Australia represented the interests of smaller, less powerful nations. We live in a complex, interconnected world where countries cannot address, on their own, some of the major challenges we face today.

Australia has provided many peacekeepers and resource support to many UN-led peacekeeping missions. Not all operations have involved the UN.

Role of peacekeepers

The first Australian peacekeepers served as military observers to a UN operation in the Netherlands East Indies (present day Indonesia).

Many countries destroyed by war are assisted by Peacekeepers. Not only military personnel are involved. Members of the public such as scientists, doctors, aid workers, State and Federal Police, public servants, members of the clergy and other specialists are also called to assist.


Duties of peacekeepers might include:

- operations as military observers to give logistical support and monitor ceasefire violations
- standing between hostile armies
- treating casualties
- landmine clearance operations (and teaching locals to do it)
- providing communications, medical and movement control teams
- supporting democratic elections
- providing policing support functions
- helping to deliver or make possible humanitarian aid

For many Australians, peacekeeping can be a personally rewarding experience, offering:

- extensive training before deployment
- support during the operation
- development of skills, experience and career
- a rewarding experience of helping others and witnessing positive outcomes for unstable or disadvantaged regions

Some peacekeepers are armed, others are not. They are limited as to how much force they can use while carrying out their duties. This places them in, at times, dangerous situations. They work either alone or in small groups. Australia, more recently, has committed to missions in Africa, Asia and the Pacific region.

Warrant Officer Paul Copeland, a veteran peacekeeper of Cambodia and Sinai missions, summarised the different experiences of service men and women in wartime and peacekeeping missions:

In a war it's a simple case of contacting an identified enemy and trying to win a battle. Whereas when it comes to peacekeeping you're constrained, to a large degree, by UN (United Nations) mandates, the charters, the ROEs (rules of engagement) and what you can and can't do."

Our service men and women have helped establish Australia's reputation as a willing, experienced and generous contributor to regional and global peace and security.

Australians as peacekeepers

Since 1947, members of the Australian Defence Force (ADF) have been involved in UN and other multinational peacekeeping operations. Most recently, thousands of troops have been deployed in anti-terrorism campaigns in Afghanistan, the Middle East and South West Africa. Peacekeeping locations that involved Australian military personnel include: Indonesia 1947 to 1951; East Timor 1999 to 2013 (under INTERFET, UNTAET, UNMISET, Operation Tower and Operation Astute) and 36 other missions all over the world.

As a leader in its region, Australia has led or taken a leading role in: UN Transitional Authority in Cambodia (UNTAC) from 1992 to 1993; Multinational Peace Monitoring Group in Bougainville from 1998 to 2003; Multinational International Force for East Timor (INTERFET) from 1999 to 2000; Regional Assistance Mission to Solomon Islands (RAMSI) from 2003 to 2017.

The Australian Peacekeeping Memorial in Canberra was officially dedicated by Australia's Governor-General, Sir Peter Cosgrove, on 14 September 2017.



42 for 42

In 2016, four Afghanistan combat veterans founded the non-profit organization 42 for 42 to raise funds to build a Memorial Garden in Brisbane that would honour their fallen mates and educate the public about why the war occurred.

17th February, 2021

An important aspect was to represent the unknown soldiers who were losing their battle back home and falling victim to suicide.

Having had struggles returning home themselves, this was and is an issue that is close to their hearts. Every deployment sent to Afghanistan faced different circumstances and had different outcomes. It's important that we don't forget that this was Australia's longest war and a war on terror, which has shaken the world. The Afghanistan War Memorial Garden will be built as a storyline around each deployment, incorporating our fallen soldiers and our Victoria Cross winners.

After WWI, Australian soldiers came together and built the Great Ocean Road in Victoria. This was a source of inspiration when establishing a plan for The Afghanistan War Memorial Garden in Brisbane. It has always been the main project of the 42 for 42, and has been a collaboration of many veterans, their families and proud Australians coming together to do their bit. It will continue to serve as a place to remember and honour all the deployments to Afghanistan and educate the next generations to come.

42 for 42 began with a 42-hour challenge, in which Afghanistan veteran Sean Mulqueen walked the concourse and stairs of Suncorp Stadium for 42 hours straight carrying 42 kilos in a military pack. As each hour passed, a kilo was removed from the pack by members of the 42 - families of the fallen, veterans and supporters of the 42. It represented lightening the load for soldiers.

This led to the annual 42 hour challenge at Suncorp Stadium every November for anyone to participate in. 42 represents the 41 soldiers Australia lost in Afghanistan, with the 42nd being the soldiers we have lost to suicide and those wo are still struggling with their wounds and injuries post-war.

The team quickly expanded as the 42 for 42 are dedicated to supporting the families of fallen Afghanistan soldiers as well as combat veterans who have returned from active duty in Afghanistan, and their families. The 42 for 42 members have worked hard to maintain a positive environment, where veterans and families can join, participate and contribute to the organization as they wish. It supports the Afghanistan veteran community by helping acknowledge, establish, and increase awareness of events, groups, support programs, job help and financial assistance when required.
